THE VIEW FROM THE TOP

Ann and I spent some days visiting Western North Carolina, driving through the Great Smoky Mountains. One day we visited Clingmans Dome, which, at 6,643 feet, is the highest point in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. On a clear day, you can see seven different states from the top of Clingmans Dome. It is a seven-mile drive to the end of Clingmans Dome Road, ending in a parking lot at the base of a half mile trail that leads to the summit. The trail is paved and steep. Very steep! Half a mile doesn't sound too difficult, until you figure in that short distance you climb 330 feet in height. I am not in the best of shape, so you can imagine what my climb to the top was like. Fortunately, there are several benches along the way where one can take a quick break. The important thing to remember is that you must keep going! Slow and steady does indeed win the race – but only if you keep moving! I can promise you that the views from the top are worth the hike. The mountain tops and valleys seem to go on forever!

Life consists of ups and downs, of valleys deep and mountains high. If your life is anything like mine, time spent in the valley is hard. Anxiety, fearfulness, despair, uncertainty, anger, selfishness, criticism of others; all these and more fruitfully grow in the valley. But there is a path out. A path built from trusting that God has a purpose for us, a purpose built upon our trust in God's goodness. Remember Pastor Bill's favorite verse he quoted time and time again: "For I know the plans I have for you, plans for peace, not evil, to give you a future and hope—*never forget that.*" (Jeremiah 29:11)

People are quick to point out a church's faults. They don't have this, do that, or have a program for what is really important. That church is stuck in the past, refuses to change, and has no vision for the future. Unfortunately, all too often, the critics are right. But one thing I know a faithful church does well: they pray for, lift up, and help carry each other up from the valley, to the top, where the view is incredible.

I thank you for the times you have carried me. I thank you for the times you have joined together to carry others. Love has a home here at Olive Branch.

THE PRIMARY SOURCE OF THE KNOWLEDGE OF GOD

In Matthew 4:4, Jesus quoted Deuteronomy 8:3: "It takes more than bread to stay alive. It takes a steady stream of words from God's mouth." (The Message)

The first stories about God that I heard and read at a very early age came from the Bible as taught in Sunday School. My perception of who God is was generated by that information.

This is evidence of the work of the Spirit in one's life. Scripture points this out especially in 2 Timothy 3:14-17:

"But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, 15 and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. 16 All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, 17 so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work."

With the Word of God treasured in our hearts, children and adults will grow in their knowledge of the Lord with the confidence that God wants us to grow in that knowledge. It's never too late to begin the storing of a knowledge of God in your mind and heart.

That knowledge is best obtained by one's personal investment in reading the Bible itself, not just reading what others write about it or listening to what others say about it.

My prayer is that Olive Branch will be proficient, equipped for every good work as empowered by the Holy Spirit.



STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE NEWS

In November, 2016, the congregation approved the 2017 budget of \$370,877.81 that included \$65,000 for an Associate Minister/Youth Director. Despite some very hard work by our search committee, the position has not yet been filled. We have no budget requirement for the Associate Minister/Youth Director position until it is filled. In the bulletin each week we provide a current status of giving compared to the budget. Because we have no requirement at this time for the Associate Minister/Youth Director, we have changed the weekly report to more accurately depict giving compared to the actual budget requirement. Our giving is currently ahead of the revised requirement. When an Associate Minister/Youth Director is hired, our budget requirement will increase and we will need to increase our giving.

HALLOWEEN MYTHS AND ORIGINS

The Name

Hallowmas is a three-day Catholic holiday where saints are honored and people pray for the recently deceased. At the start of the 11th century, it was decreed by the pope that it would last from Oct. 31 (All Hallow's Eve) until Nov. 2, most likely because that was when Samhain was celebrated and the church was trying to convert the pagans. "All Hallow's Eve" then evolved into "All Hallow's Even," and by the 18th century it was commonly referred to as "Hallowe'en."

Trick-or-Treating

was brought to America by the Irish and became popular during the early 20th century, but died out during WWII when sugar was rationed. After the rationing ended in 1947, children's magazine "Jack and Jill," radio program "The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet," and the "Peanuts" comic strip all helped to re-popularize the tradition of dressing up in costumes and asking for candy from door-to-door. By 1952, trick-or-treating was hugely popular again.

Black Cats

Often used as symbols of bad luck, black cats grace many Halloween decorations. The black cat's bad reputation dates back to the Dark Ages, when witch hunts were commonplace. Elderly, solitary women were often accused of witchcraft, and their pet cats were said to be their "familiars," or demonic animals that had been given to them by the devil. Another medieval myth told that Satan turned himself into a cat when socializing with witches. But nowadays, black cats aren't synonymous with bad luck and mischief everywhere — in Ireland, Scotland and England, it's considered good luck for a black cat to cross your path.

Jack-O'-Lanterns

A fun fall activity, carving Jack-o'-lanterns actually has its roots in a sinister, tragic fable. Celtic folklore

tells the tale of a drunken farmer named Jack who tricked the devil, but his trickery resulted in him being turned away from both the gates of heaven and hell after he died. Having no choice but to wander around the darkness of purgatory, Jack made a lantern from a turnip and a burning lump of coal that the devil had tossed him from hell. Jack, the story goes, used the lantern to guide his lost soul; as such, the Celts believed that placing Jack-o'-lanterns outside would help guide lost spirits home when they wander the streets on Halloween. Originally made using a hollowed-out turnip with a small candle inside, Jack-o'-lanterns' frightening carved faces also served to scare evil spirits away. When the Irish potato famine of 1846 forced Irish families to flee to North America, the tradition came with them. Since turnips were hard to come by in the states at the time, pumpkins were used as a substitute.

Bats


Medieval folklore also described bats as witches' familiars, and seeing a bat on Halloween was considered to be quite an ominous sign. One myth was that if a bat was spotted flying around one's house three times, it meant that someone in that house would soon die. Another myth was that if a bat flew into your house on Halloween, it was a sign that your house was haunted because ghosts had let the bat in.

Candy Apples

The fusion of Celtic and Roman traditions is behind Halloween's candy-apple staple. Samhain was around the time of the Roman festival honoring Pomona, the goddess of fruit trees. The goddess is often symbolized by an apple, so the fruit became synonymous with Samhain celebrations of the harvest, and the apple was thought to be a sacred fruit.

Candy Corn

The candy most synonymous with Halloween, candy corn was invented in the late 1880s and began to be mass-produced in the early 1900s. The original process for making candy corn was cumbersome and time-consuming, as each color of syrup had to be heated up in large vats and carefully poured by hand into specially shaped molds. But the yellow, orange and white candy — meant to resemble a corn kernel — was a huge hit and remains a popular part of Halloween to this day.
